Frequently Asked Questions

Q: My ten-year-old daughter wants a **dog**. But that's a big responsibility. What's the best choice for her first pet?

A: You might consider a less demanding **pet**. A **cat** takes less work, but still needs a lot of attention. Other **warm-blooded mammals**, like **rodents**, require significantly less care and caged animals create less mess around the house.

Non-mammals are also easy to care for. But they offer less interaction. For instance, you generally cannot touch **aquatic** animals like **fish**. However, caring for them still teaches responsibility. But be careful about **cold-blooded** animals, like **reptiles**. Some are more **dangerous** than they look.

Finally, you might consider a **bird**. If you do, make sure it is not aggressive with people.

- acidity** [N-UNCOUNT-U13] **Acidity** refers to the level of acid in a substance.
- allergic reaction** [N-COUNT-U5] An **allergic reaction** is the response of the body when it comes in contact with a certain substance.
- alligator** [N-COUNT-U15] An **alligator** is a large reptile that has a long body and sharp teeth. Alligators typically live in tropical rivers and swamps.
- amphibious** [ADJ-U11] If a creature is **amphibious**, it is able to live both on land and in water.
- annoying** [ADJ-U5] When something is **annoying**, it is irritating and bothersome.
- apparel** [N-UNCOUNT-U4] **Apparel** is clothing that is worn on particular occasions.
- aquarium** [N-COUNT-U12] An **aquarium** is a clear glass or plastic container that holds water animals, such as fish.
- aquatic** [ADJ-U1] If an animal is **aquatic**, it lives in the water.
- arthropod** [N-COUNT-U15] An **arthropod** is a small creature with multiple segments making up its body. Spiders and insects are types of arthropods.
- automatic** [ADJ-U6] If something is **automatic**, it occurs without a person directly controlling it.
- available** [ADJ-U5] When something is **available** it is easily obtainable and ready for use.
- ball** [N-COUNT-U9] A **ball** is a small, round object that is used as a toy.
- bathe** [V-T-U2] When you **bathe** something or somebody, you wash it/them.
- bark** [N-UNCOUNT-U12] **Bark** is the tough, woody covering of a plant. Pieces of bark are a common substrate in terrariums.
- bark control** [N-UNCOUNT-U7] **Bark control** is the process of discouraging or preventing a dog from barking (making a sharp, loud sound).
- bed** [N-COUNT-U4] A **bed** is where someone or something sleeps.
- bedding** [N-UNCOUNT-U10] **Bedding** is material that is used to line a hutch or cage.
- bell** [N-COUNT-U8] A **bell** is a metal ball with a smaller ball inside of it that makes a noise when it moves.
- betta** [N-COUNT-U11] A **betta** is a small fish that lives in freshwater. Bettas are often kept as pets, and they are known for being aggressive towards other fish.
- big cat** [N-COUNT-U15] A **big cat** is a large wild feline, such as a tiger or a lion.
- bird** [N-COUNT-U1] A **bird** is an animal with wings that flies through the air.
- birdbath** [N-COUNT-U14] A **birdbath** is a container filled with water for wild birds to drink from and bathe in.
- birdfeeder** [N-COUNT-U14] A **birdfeeder** is a container that holds and dispenses food for wild birds.
- birdseed** [N-UNCOUNT-U14] **Birdseed** is a mixture of seeds that birds eat.
- bite** [N-COUNT-U5] A **bite** is a wound created from biting by an animal.
- boa constrictor** [N-COUNT-U15] A **boa constrictor** is a type of large snake that kills its prey by squeezing it.
- bond** [V-I-U2] To **bond** is to form a friendship with someone or something.
- breakaway collar** [N-COUNT-U8] A **breakaway collar** is a type of collar that is designed to break apart under a certain amount of pressure. This prevents the pet from becoming stuck or strangled if the collar becomes caught on something.
- breed** [N-COUNT-U3] A **breed** is a group of animals within a species that share certain genetic qualities. For example, animals of the same breed look similar to each other.
- brush** [N-COUNT-U5] A **brush** is a tool with a cluster of stiff hairs or wires that are used to untangle and smooth a person's or animal's hair.
- brush** [V-T-U2] To **brush** hair or fur is to clean it using a tool with stiff bristles.
- built-in** [ADJ-U14] A **built-in** piece of equipment is one that forms part of a bigger piece of equipment and is sold as one item and not separately.
- cage** [N-COUNT-U10] A **cage** is a metal or plastic box where an animal lives.
- cage liner** [N-COUNT-U14] A **cage liner** is a piece of material that covers the bottom of a cage. It is used by pet owners to help them collect birds' waste and leftovers.

canary [N-COUNT-U14] A **canary** is a small finch that is commonly kept as a pet and is known for its singing. Many canaries are yellow.

canine [N-COUNT-U3] A **canine** is a dog. “Canine” is often used formally.

canister [N-COUNT-U6] A **canister** is a large container that is used to store things, such as food.

canned food [N-UNCOUNT-U6] **Canned food**, sometimes called wet food, is pet food with a soft, wet consistency and is sold in a can.

captivity [N-UNCOUNT-U15] **Captivity** is the state of being trapped or held somewhere without being able to leave.

carrier [N-COUNT-U4] A **carrier** is a special box that is used to safely move a pet from one location to another.

cat [N-COUNT-U1] A **cat** is an animal with sharp claws that is often kept as a pet or to control rodents.

cat condo [N-COUNT-U8] A **cat condo** is a structure with an enclosed space that is designed for a cat to crawl into.

cat tree [N-COUNT-U8] A **cat tree** is a structure that is designed for a cat to climb on.

catnip [N-UNCOUNT-U9] **Catnip** is a plant with a smell that attracts and excites cats.

change [V-T-U2] To **change** something is to replace it with something newer and cleaner.

chew toy [N-COUNT-U9] A **chew toy** is a durable toy that is designed for a pet to bite repeatedly.

chew-proof [ADJ-U10] If something is **chew-proof**, it will not be destroyed by sharp teeth.

coat [N-COUNT-U3] A **coat**, or fur, is the hair the covers certain types of animals, such as dogs and cats.

cold-blooded [ADJ-U1] If an animal is **cold-blooded**, it changes its body temperature to adapt to the environment. Reptiles and fish are cold-blooded.

collapsible [ADJ-U6] If something is **collapsible**, it can be folded into a smaller size.

collar [N-COUNT-U4] A **collar** is a strip of fabric or leather that is used to attach an ID tag to a pet’s neck.

crate [N-COUNT-U7] A **crate**, or kennel, is a type of plastic, metal, or wire container that a dog sleeps in or is transported in.

dangerous [ADJ-U15] If something is **dangerous**, it is capable of causing harm.

deadly [ADJ-U15] If something is **deadly**, it is capable of killing a person or another living thing.

diaper [N-COUNT-U7] A **diaper** is a piece of soft cloth that wraps around a dog’s waist and between its legs. It is used for liquid and solid waste.

disposable [ADJ-U14] If a product or material is **disposable**, it is designed to be used only once and then be thrown away.

dog [N-COUNT-U1] A **dog** is an animal that is often kept as a pet, to guard buildings or to hunt.

doghouse [N-COUNT-U7] A **doghouse** is a small outdoor structure where a dog can sleep or take shelter.

domestic [ADJ-U15] If an animal is **domestic**, it is commonly kept as a pet and is well suited to life with humans.

electronic collar [N-COUNT-U4] An **electronic collar** is a type of collar that gives off noise or electric shocks to control a pet’s behavior.

eliminate [V-T-U13] To **eliminate** something is to take it out or remove it.

exact [ADJ-U13] If something is **exact**, it is correct and accurate.

exotic [ADJ-U15] If something is **exotic**, it is unusual or foreign.

expansion kit [N-COUNT-U10] An **expansion kit** is used to add additional space, such as a tunnel, to a rodent’s cage.

feather [N-COUNT-U9] A **feather** is a lightweight object that grows on a bird.

feed [V-T-U2] To **feed** an animal is to give it food.

feeder [N-COUNT-U6] A **feeder** is a device that supplies food to an animal.

feline [N-COUNT-U3] A **feline** is any animal that comes from the cat family.

fetch toy [N-COUNT-U9] A **fetch toy** is a toy that someone throws in order for a pet to retrieve.

filter [N-COUNT-U13] A **filter** is a machine that cleans the water in a fish tank.

filter [V-T-U6] To **filter** something is to remove unwanted substances or impurities from it.

finch [N-COUNT-U14] A **finch** is a small, colorful bird that eats seeds.

Glossary

- fish** [N-COUNT-U1] A **fish** is a type of animal that lives in the water and is often kept in tanks.
- fish feeder** [N-COUNT-U13] A **fish feeder** is a large piece of food that fish gradually eat away over time.
- flake** [N-COUNT-U13] A **flake** is a small, thin piece of food.
- flea** [N-COUNT-U5] A **flea** is a small, wingless, parasitic insect that has the ability to leap.
- fluorescent lamp** [N-COUNT-U12] A **fluorescent lamp** is a kind of lamp that produces visible light when an electric current passes through the lamp and causes its phosphor coating to glow.
- fore-** [PREFIX-U3] If something is **fore-**, it is located at the front of something. For example, a dog's forelegs are its front legs.
- fountain** [N-COUNT-U6] A **fountain** is a device that pumps water.
- fox** [N-COUNT-U15] A **fox** is a dog-like wild animal with a bushy tail and long nose. It is often reddish in color.
- freshwater** [ADJ-U11] If a creature is **freshwater**, it exists in water that does not contain salt.
- frog** [N-COUNT-U11] A **frog** is a small, amphibious animal that uses its long back legs to jump.
- frozen** [ADJ-U13] If something is **frozen**, it is kept very cold.
- fur** [N-UNCOUNT-U3] **Fur**, or a coat, is the hair that covers certain types of animals, such as dogs and cats.
- gate** [N-COUNT-U7] A **gate** is a type of barrier that blocks the entrance to a particular area. It can be opened and closed to allow or prevent access.
- gecko** [N-COUNT-U11] A **gecko** is a small lizard that lives in hot environments.
- goldfish** [N-COUNT-U11] A **goldfish** is a very small, orange fish that lives in freshwater.
- gravel** [N-UNCOUNT-U12] **Gravel** is a material made of small pieces of rock. It is a common substrate in aquariums.
- gravity bin** [N-COUNT-U10] A **gravity bin** is a container that dispenses more food when the first serving of food has been eaten.
- groom** [V-T-U2] To **groom** an animal is to brush and clean it.
- hair loss** [N-UNCOUNT-U5] **Hair loss** is a condition whereby someone's hair falls out.
- hairless** [ADJ-U3] If an animal is **hairless**, it does not have any hair or fur.
- hammock** [N-COUNT-U10] A **hammock** is a bed that hangs in the air.
- harness** [N-COUNT-U7] A **harness** is a piece of equipment with straps that wraps around a dog's body. Owners clip a leash to the harness in order to walk a dog.
- heater** [N-COUNT-U12] A **heater** is a device that makes an area warmer.
- hind-** [PREFIX-U3] If something is **hind-**, it is located at the rear of something. For example, a dog's hindquarters are its back legs or hips.
- hood** [N-COUNT-U12] A **hood** is a device that covers the top of an aquarium or terrarium. It typically contains a lamp.
- hooded** [ADJ-U8] If something is **hooded**, it has a covering over the top of it.
- housebreak** [V-T-U2] To **housebreak** an animal is to teach it not to urinate and defecate in the wrong places.
- hutch** [N-COUNT-U10] A **hutch** is a box or cage where rabbits live.
- hydrometer** [N-COUNT-U13] A **hydrometer** is a device that is used to measure whether an aquarium has the right amount of salt.
- ID tag** [N-COUNT-U4] An **ID tag** is a piece of metal or plastic with information about a pet's name and owner.
- indoor cat** [N-COUNT-U4] An **indoor cat** is a cat that lives inside one's home and is not allowed outside.
- indoor kennel** [N-COUNT-U7] An **indoor kennel**, or crate, is a type of plastic, metal, or wire container that a dog sleeps in or is transported in.
- insect** [N-COUNT-U11] An **insect** is a small animal with or without wings, such as a butterfly, a fly, an ant, etc.
- itch** [N-UNCOUNT-U5] **Itch** is a sensation that causes the desire to scratch.
- kibble** [N-UNCOUNT-U6] **Kibble**, is dry food in the form of small, crunchy pellets, and is usually sold in a bag.
- kitten** [N-COUNT-U3] A **kitten** is a young cat.

laser pointer [N-COUNT-U9] A **laser pointer** is a device that produces a narrow, powerful beam of light. Pets often like to chase the light from a laser.

leash [N-COUNT-U7] A **leash** is a strip of fabric, rope, or leather that attaches to a dog's collar or harness in order to maintain control over the dog in public.

LED [ADJ-U12] If a lamp is **LED**, it emits a strong beam of light that uses little energy to produce.

litter [N-UNCOUNT-U4] **Litter** is a material, usually consisting of small particles, that is used to fill a litter box.

litter box [N-COUNT-U2] A **litter box** is a box containing litter where a cat may expel waste indoors.

lizard [N-COUNT-U11] A **lizard** is a reptile that has four legs, a long tail, and rough skin. It usually lives in hot places.

longhair [N-COUNT-U3] A **longhair** is an animal with a long, thick coat.

low-maintenance [ADJ-U11] If something is **low-maintenance**, it doesn't need much care.

mammal [N-COUNT-U1] A **mammal** is a type of animal that gives birth to live young. Humans, dogs, and cats are mammals.

marsupial [N-COUNT-U15] A **marsupial** is an animal that carries its babies in a pouch. Kangaroos and opossums are examples of marsupials.

obesity [N-UNCOUNT-U6] **Obesity** is the state of an animal being overweight.

nest [N-COUNT-U14] A **nest** is a place where a bird lays eggs and cares for its young.

optimal health [N-UNCOUNT-U6] **Optimal health** is the state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and the absence of disease.

ornament [N-COUNT-U12] An **ornament** is an item that is used for decoration.

parrot [N-COUNT-U14] A **parrot** is a tropical bird with a curved beak. It can mimic words and other sounds.

pellet [N-COUNT-U13] A **pellet** is a small, round piece of food.

perch [N-COUNT-U14] A **perch** is a bar that a bird sits on.

permanent [ADJ-U5] When something is **permanent**, it is lasting for an indefinite time.

pet [N-COUNT-U1] A **pet** is an animal that someone keeps in his or her house for companionship.

pet [V-T-U2] To **pet** an animal is to touch it caringly.

pet door [N-COUNT-U4] A **pet door** is a special opening in a door that lets a pet enter and leave a house.

pet sitting [N-UNCOUNT-U2] **Pet sitting** is when someone looks after someone else's pet.

pick-up bag [N-COUNT-U7] A **pick-up bag** is a plastic container that someone uses to collect a dog's waste.

play [V-I-U2] To **play** is to perform an activity for fun.

playpen [N-COUNT-U4] A **playpen** is a special structure that allows a pet or child to safely play in.

plush [ADJ-U9] A **plush** toy is made of soft, thick material.

pooper scooper [N-COUNT-U7] A **pooper scooper** is a small tool that someone uses to collect and clean up dog waste, especially from public places.

primate [N-COUNT-U15] A **primate** is a highly intelligent mammal that belongs to the same group as humans. Apes, chimpanzees, and monkeys are examples of primates.

privacy [N-UNCOUNT-U8] **Privacy** is the state of being alone and not disturbed by others.

puppy [N-COUNT-U3] A **puppy** is a young dog.

ramp [N-COUNT-U4] A **ramp** is a slanted surface used to help someone or something move from one level to a higher level.

rattle [N-COUNT-U9] A **rattle** is a toy that produces noise when someone shakes it.

rawhide [N-UNCOUNT-U7] **Rawhide** is dried, untreated animal skin. Rawhide is often given to dogs to chew on.

reptile [N-COUNT-U1] A **reptile** is an animal with scaly skin that reproduces by laying eggs.

rodent [N-COUNT-U1] A **rodent** is a small animal that is sometimes considered a pest but may also be kept as a pet.

safety [N-UNCOUNT-U8] **Safety** is the state of feeling secure, i.e. not in danger.

Glossary

- saliva** [N-UNCOUNT-U5] **Saliva** is a clear liquid located in the mouths of organisms and secreted by the salivary glands.
- saltwater** [ADJ-U11] If a creature is **saltwater**, it exists in water that contains salt.
- scoop** [N-COUNT-U6] A **scoop** is a device that is shaped like a large spoon and is used to remove materials, such as food, from a container.
- scratcher** [N-COUNT-U8] A **scratcher** is a surface or material that is designed for a cat to scratch its nails on.
- scratching post** [N-COUNT-U4] A **scratching post** is a wooden construction that is covered with rough material which helps the cats remove old material from their claws.
- self-cleaning** [ADJ-U8] If a litter box is **self-cleaning**, it automatically removes cat waste from the main area of the box and stores it for disposal.
- shelter** [N-COUNT-U8] A **shelter** is a place or building where unwanted or stray pets are kept and receive care.
- shorthair** [N-COUNT-U3] A **shorthair** is an animal with a short coat.
- small animal ball** [N-COUNT-U10] A **small animal ball** is a clear plastic ball that allows small animals to move around a room.
- snake** [N-COUNT-U11] A **snake** is a kind of reptile without legs that has smooth skin. Some snakes release poison when they bite.
- spot-on** [N-COUNT-U5] A 'spot-on' is a flea treatment which is applied in seconds by applying the liquid onto the back of the pet. It provides a month-long protection from fleas and other parasites.
- squeaker** [N-COUNT-U9] A **squeaker** is a noisemaker that is inside many dog toys.
- stand** [N-COUNT-U6] A **stand** is a structure that holds something in a particular place.
- sterilizer** [N-COUNT-U13] A **sterilizer** is a device that kills bacteria and viruses in water.
- stuffed animal** [N-COUNT-U9] A **stuffed animal** is a toy that is filled with a soft material and is designed to look like an animal.
- substrate** [N-COUNT-U12] A **substrate** is a material that covers the floor or base of an environment, such as the bottom of an aquarium or terrarium.
- supplies** [N-PLURAL-U4] **Supplies** are things that are needed by a certain group.
- tail** [N-COUNT-U3] A **tail** is the part of an animal's body that extends out from its lower back.
- tank** [N-COUNT-U12] A **tank** is a glass or plastic container that holds particular types of pets, and may refer to an aquarium or terrarium.
- teaser** [N-COUNT-U9] A **teaser** is a cat toy with a ball, feather, or other attractive object at the end of a string or stick.
- terrarium** [N-COUNT-U12] A **terrarium** is a clear glass or plastic container that holds land animals, such as lizards.
- test kit** [N-COUNT-U13] A **test kit** is a group of materials that are used to check the chemical properties of the water in a fish tank.
- thermometer** [N-COUNT-U12] A **thermometer** is a device that measures the temperature of an area, or how hot or cold it is.
- tick** [N-COUNT-U5] A **tick** is a parasitic, bloodsucking arachnid.
- toy** [N-COUNT-U4] A **toy** is something that a child or animal plays with, and is generally not used for any other purpose.
- toy poodle** [N-COUNT-U3] A **toy poodle** is a small dog that belongs in the poodle dog breed.
- train** [V-T-U2] To **train** an animal is to teach it the best way to behave.
- training pad** [N-COUNT-U7] A **training pad** is an absorbent piece of material with plastic backing that someone uses while teaching a dog not to expel waste in the house.
- transmit** [V-T-U5] To **transmit** something means to transfer or pass it from one person to another.
- treat** [N-COUNT-U6] A **treat** is a type of pet food that is usually given to the pet in small quantities, often as a reward for good behavior, but is not intended to be the pet's primary food.
- treat-dispensing** [ADJ-U9] If a toy is **treat-dispensing**, it releases food when a pet plays with it.
- tunnel** [N-COUNT-U10] A **tunnel** is a round, enclosed passage.

turtle [N-COUNT-U11] A **turtle** is a reptile that has a hard shell surrounding its body. Turtles live mostly in water but often partly on land as well.

ultrasonic [ADJ-U7] If a sound is **ultrasonic**, it cannot be heard by humans, but may be heard by dogs.

vegetarian [ADJ-U11] An animal or person that is **vegetarian**, doesn't eat meat.

venomous [ADJ-U15] If an animal is **venomous**, it is capable of injecting poison into another living thing, either by a sting or a bite.

walk [V-T-U2] To **walk** an animal, such as a dog, is to take it outside for exercise.

wand [N-COUNT-U9] A **wand** is a long, thin stick.

warm-blooded [ADJ-U1] If an animal is **warm-blooded**, it keeps a constant body temperature. Mammals are warm-blooded.

water bottle [N-COUNT-U10] A **water bottle** is a container that a rodent can drink water out of.

water conditioner [N-COUNT-U13] A **water conditioner** is a chemical that makes water safe to use with fish.

waterer [N-COUNT-U6] A **waterer** is a device that holds water for an animal to drink.

well-balanced [ADJ-U6] When a feeding routine is **well-balanced**, it means that it has good proportions of food.

wheel [N-COUNT-U10] A **wheel** is a round, spinning object that a rodent runs inside of, allowing it to exercise.

wild [ADJ-U14] If an animal is **wild**, it lives outdoors and is not a pet.

window perch [N-COUNT-U8] A **window perch** is a structure that attaches to a windowsill and is designed for cats to sit on and look out of the window.

wood shavings [N-UNCOUNT-U10] **Wood shavings** are a type of bedding made from thin pieces of wood.
